TWELVE! Twelve excited youth attended our Pedals, Pipes and Pizza event last Saturday to find out more about the King of Instruments. The morning began with a demonstration of First Presbyterian Church's sanctuary organ by Tina Wagoner, with yours truly narrating as the various sounds and dynamic ranges of the instrument were explored. The cymbelstern and chines were favorites! Then PPP organizer Robert Whitaker led the group on an organ crawl, pointing out the various types of pipes as they were played. After viewing a video on pipe organs, it was time to break for pizza before heading to the chapel for another organ demonstration, this time with Brian Hunt at the console.



It was wonderful to hear the variety of questions from our young participants, all of whom were in the 12- to 17-year-old range. But perhaps best of all was open console time in the sanctuary when everyone had a chance to play something on the organ. We heard Bach, Chopin, Pachel-

bel, Beethoven, and even an abbreviated arrangement of Widor's famous Toccata as each young person took a turn at the console. It was such fun to watch them explore this new instrument, and encourage each other in the process. The afternoon ended with Glenna Metcalfe's performance of a Bach prelude, pulling out all the stops.

Tremendous thanks to Robert Whitaker, our Education Chair, for organizing Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza for these potential young organists! A number of our members were introduced to the organ at about this same age, so perhaps we have nurtured a spark of interest in some of these young people as well. Thanks to Tina, Brian, and Glenna for playing, and to Bill Webber for delivering the pizza for our lunch. It takes a team effort to have a successful event like this. Would you like to be involved next year? Do you know a young person who has shown some interest in the organ? Let us know! It's up to all of us to encourage the next generation of organists!

Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza

On Saturday, February 23, twelve young and eager piano students, ages 12-17, gathered at First Presbyterian Church in downtown Lexington for Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza. The students came prepared to learn about the pipe organ and even had the opportunity to play it for themselves.

The day began with introductions of the participants and a demonstration of the sanctuary organ followed by a tour inside the organ. We then gathered in the church library to view the short APOBA/AIO video "Make a Joyful Noise: The Pipe Organ in Worship" which led into the "pizza" portion of the day. We were then treated to a demonstration of the chapel organ after which we returned to the sanctuary for an opportunity for the students to try out the organ for themselves and to play the pieces they brought.

Many local organists also participated and helped out to make this a smooth-running and enjoyable event for everyone. Many thanks go to Tina Wagoner, host organist, who also demonstrated the sanctuary organ with a special piece called "Rex: King of the Instruments" by Daniel Burton which showcased the organ's numerous sounds and capabilities. Thanks also go to dean Jane Johnson (Crestwood Christian, Lexington) who was present for the entire event and who also served narrator for "Rex," Bill Webber (St. John's Episcopal, Versailles) who picked up and delivered the pizza, Brian Hunt (Cathedral of Christ the King, Lexington) who demonstrated the chapel organ with the first movement of the Walther Concerto in b minor and "Cantilène religieuse" by Dubois, and Glenna Metcalfe (Faith Baptist, Georgetown) who ended the session at the sanctuary organ playing the Bach Prelude in C (BWV 547). My sincerest thanks to these fine people for their gracious help in making my first experience of organizing this event a pleasurable one and a success!

Certifiable (cont.)

Certification

For those who wish to become certified through the AGO, several options are available. Let's take a look at the certificate which is probably most applicable to church organists: the Service Playing Certificate (SPC).

The SPC is designed for the organist who can meet the performance requirements of the typical worship service. Those who undertake this exam are required to do the following:

- 1.Perform organ literature of modest difficulty. The candidate is provided with three lists (Baroque, 19th century, and Contemporary) and choose one from each list to prepare ahead of time and play.
- 2.Accompany two choral anthems. The candidate chooses two anthems from a list of five to prepare ahead of time and play as if accompanying a competent choir.
- 3.Lead and accompany three congregational hymns and a psalm. All three hymns may be chosen and prepared ahead of time (from the AGO Examination Hymn Booklet free upon request from the AGO headquarters).
- 4. Sight-read a short passage of music on two staves. This tests the candidate's ability to maintain the indicated tempo with accuracy of notes and rhythm.
- 5. Transpose a hymn, with advance preparation. One hymn requires two transpositions not more than a major second in either direction.

The format of the SPC exam follows that of a worship service: Prelude, Opening Hymn (with two transpositions), Psalm, Anthem, Middle Hymn, Second Anthem, Offertory, Sight-reading (inserted into the "service" at this point), Closing Hymn, and Postlude. The SPC exam is recorded at a local church under the supervision of a proctor and the recording is sent to National Headquarters for evaluation.

Please consider taking the time to become certified by the AGO. There are four levels of certification for organists: Service Playing, Colleague, Associate, and Fellow; as well as a certificate for Choirmasters.
