Maria LeRose completed her Master of Music in Sacred Music with an emphasis in organ as well as a Certificate in Music Theory Pedagogy at the University of Kentucky in 2006. She graduated with a Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance in 2004. She is currently an organ student of Dr. Schuyler Robinson.

Maria studied with Dr. John Turnbull at Converse College in Spartanburg, SC during her first two years of undergraduate study. In summer 2004, Maria studied organ in Salzburg, Austria with Bernhard Gfrerer. While at Converse College Maria was honored as a Daniel Music Scholar and received a Music Honors Scholarship. During her undergraduate studies at UK she was selected twice to represent the keyboard division at the Honors Convocation Recital. She was a 2005, 2007, & 2010 - 2012 scholarship winner from the Fellowship of United Methodists in Music and Worship Arts.

Currently Maria is the music director and organist at Trinity Episcopal Church in Danville, KY and is on the faculty at the Music Institute of Lexington. Maria is working toward a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Organ Performance. This is her third doctoral recital toward her degree.

#### **Shape Note Singing Returns to the Bluegrass**

Many thanks to Charles Coulston, Chair of the AASHS Organizing Committe, for submitting the following:

The Appalachian Association of Sacred Harp Singers have the good fortune of having Mr Tim Eriksen to come through Lexington on **Thursday**, **April 11**, **2013**, when he will perform in the John Jacob Niles Gallery of the Little Fine Arts Library, University of KY, with his trio as well as conduct a shape note singing school. The trio will perform at noon, then the singing school will be convened from 7:00-9:00pm in the same location.

Tim Eriksen is acclaimed for transforming American tradition with his startling interpretations of old ballads, love songs, shape-note gospel and dance tunes from New England and Southern Appalachia. He combines hair-raising vocals with inventive accompaniment on banjo, fiddle, guitar and bajo sexto - a twelve string Mexican acoustic bass - creating a distinctive hardcore Americana sound that ranges from the bare bones of solo unaccompanied singing on his album Soul of the January Hills through the stripped-down voice and bajo sexto Christmas album Star in the East to the lush, multi-layered arrangements on Josh Billings Voyage (timeriksenmusic 2012), the new album of northern roots American music from the imaginary New England village of Pumpkintown.
