Roland Herzel Attends Dallas Regional Convention

SMU hosted a pre-convention recital at Caruth Auditorium in the Meadows School of the Arts featuring seven students of **Professor Stefan Engels**. The students gave an impressive performance on the III/62 Fisk with works of Karg-Elert, Bach, Cochereau, Vierne, Widor and Durufle. Robust voicing of the 1993 Fisk favors French style. The acoustics in the room seating 350 were favorable.

The Young Artists Competition began at 11:00 am the following morning at University Park Methodist; four college age students each gave a 45 minute recital of the required pieces, including a four verse hymn [Lasst uns erfreuen] sung by the congregation. The III/64 Kern tracker was well suited for its task though the audience tired a bit hearing the Frank Ferko piece four times. Movements of Bach's Trio Sonata #5 received overly cautious treatment, particularly in registration and tempos, though all four men played well. The youngest, age 19, was later announced as the winner. Stefan Engels, new organ professor at SMU [from Leipzig] presented a recital of Buxtehude, JS Bach [including the monu-

mental BWV 582], Karg-Elert and Reger at Church of the Transfiguration [Episcopal]. A page turning glitch during the opening Buxtehude was followed by a cipher, repaired by a technician within five minutes. The new III/68 Fowkes tracker behaved well thereafter. The organ case in the rear gallery has red casework; the hard surface of the slate floor and brick walls resulted in a vibrant organ sound. The end of the first evening presented one of the convention highlights – a service of Vespers for Pentecost. Situated at the front of the church [King of Glory Lutheran] were 12 musicians from North Texas University using period instruments, and accompanying a choir directed by **Dr Lenora McCroskey**. In the upper rear gallery of the church was Michael Shake on the III/49 Rosales tracker and directing the large resident choir of the church. The liturgy was 15th century; the four congregational hymns were 16th and 17th century. There were exquisite psalm settings by Schein, Eler, Tunder, Schutz and Hammerschmidt as well as organ works of Pachelbel, Weckmann and Buxtehude.

AGO Convention

Joel Bacon [Colorado State Univ] used all of the III/67 Letourneau's resources at St Marks School [Episcopal] at the next morning's recital, followed by his superb 45 minute workshop on hymn playing. A tight schedule amid dense North Dallas traffic still allowed a generous buffet lunch [served with beer and wine] at ultra modern St Monica [RC]. A young **Monica Czausz** played her memorized pieces with authority on the IV/71 Nichols and Simpson. A workshop on Martin Luther yielded this memorable Luther quote: "After the word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in the world." Christ United Methodist Church was the setting for the late afternoon recital recreating one given in Dallas one hundred years earlier [1917]. The organists [four women] wore period clothing.

After a buffet Mexican dinner came a program by **Clive Driskill-Smith** on the church's IV/84 Reuter, accompanied by percussionist **Joe Gramley**, the duo known as "Organized Rhythm." This group performed at the 2012 AGO National Convention in Nashville TN, equaling if not exceeding that memorable performance.

Christ the King [RC] was our next morning venue where Quebec Canadian **Maxine Thevenot** rendered an all-French recital on the III/Juget-Sinclair tracker high in the rear gallery. Catholics like good acoustics [so do I]. After lunch we headed to University Park Methodist for a harpsichord recital by **Elizabeth Farr**. The instrument was a massive 12 feet in length decorated in a polished black case resting on eight carved legs. The inner case was all Chinese motifs – birds, dragons and snakes, against a background of orange/red and gold. A drowsy member of the audience could be heard snoring throughout the recital. The harpsichord's mid-range was mellow and the bass was richer than chocolate cake. The evening concluded with **Nathan Laube** at the downtown Meyerson Center, home of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra and of its spectacular IV/84 Fisk.

The organ is situated high above the orchestra floor, its case dominated by the 32' Principal. Mr. Laube's 70 minute memorized recital left no one disappointed. **Rebecca Groom Te Velde's** next morning offering at Lovers Lane Methodist used a modest but arresting II/22 Casavant in their 300 seat Shipp Chapel. After lunch came **Alcee Chriss** at Highland Park Methodist on the IV/95 Dobson tracker; he played Dupre, Demessieux and Reger flawlessly and with flair. Church of the Incarnation [Episcopal] hosted an uplifting service of Solemn Evensong in grand Anglican tradition, the choir and organ [IV/71 Noack] were under **Scott Detra's** direction. The convention concluded with an evening concert by the premiere vocal group **Chanticleer** at a packed St Thomas Aquinas [RC]. What a grand week of music. Congratulations Dallas AGO !!!

Contemporary Repertoire Workshop Kicks Off New Program Year

Many thanks to **Dr. Brenda Portman** of Cincinnati, who helped us kick off our new AGO Program Year in style! Brenda's workshop, "Contemporary Organ Repertoire," covered excerpts of organ works by no fewer than twenty living (or recently deceased) composers. Many of these composers have written music for both church and concert use. Brenda presented examples that varied in level of difficulty and with the different church seasons in mind.

Brenda's presentation was well thought-out and meticulously prepared. She walked us through newer organ works by composers of many nationalities -- Canadian, French, German, English, Nigerian and American. Saving the best for last, Brenda even treated the group to some of her own original compositions. I can't imagine that anyone left this workshop without feeling inspired and with several new "must-have" pieces in mind!

Since Brenda lives so close to Lexington, we can only hope that she will come back and visit with us again soon. Many thanks go to the 21 members and guests in attendance, to **Nancy and Mike Dunn** for their delicious breakfast treats, and to our Cathedral friends, **Erich and Kathleen Balling** and **Lisa Hall**, for hosting this outstanding program!

Door prizes were won by **Wanda Deaton**, **Betsy Steiner** and **Lynn Vera**. At the conclusion of the workshop, a small group accompanied Brenda to Shakespeare and Co. for lunch. Current LexAGO Finances

As your current Treasurer, I wanted to take a few minutes to update you on our finances. We ended our 2016-2017 fiscal year on June 30, with an account balance of \$19,771.83. Our dues renewals began rolling in soon after, and while there was some change in members, our net member number has not changed (around 115 members). An exciting bit of financial news, with much thanks to our Dean and unofficial "marketing-director-in-chief" **Larry Sharp**, we have brought in nearly \$2000 in advertising through our yearbook, newsletter, and magnets. This is nearly double of what we were bringing in only 2 years ago – thanks, Larry! This brings our current account balance to around \$24,400.

As has been for several years now, our 2017-2018 program budget is set at \$3,000. This does not include our January Jubilee, which has its own budget and fundraising completely separate of our main account. While our dues and advertising covers our program budget, there are several ways you can help out:

1) Volunteer to host a guest overnight for an AGO sponsored event. You don't have to feed them dinner or provide entertainment, just a spare bedroom! This saves our chapter approx. \$200/guest/night.

2) Sign up for the Kroger Rewards program. As of June 30 when Kroger sent me their last update, there were only 5 people signed up. It takes less than five minutes to sign up, so what are you waiting for?

3) Donate! Even if it's \$10, a donation can help us out – and you can designate it for a specific program or event. This will be especially helpful for our January Jubilee.
