Give a short talk about your piece or the composer or both, or how/ when you like to use the piece for church.

NOTES FROM THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

It appears that we have left the extreme summer heat behind for the short term at least. I hope that everyone is enjoying the mild weather following the tropical rain showers.

The Education Committee has been forming a task force whose mission is to investigate the possibility of planning and hosting our very first Adult Pipe Organ Encounter (POE). Having spoken with task force member Zach Klobnak who has vast experience with these events, it appears this would be much easier to plan and less expensive to host than the youth one we did a few years ago. I sure like the sound of that!

Groups of adults that we could contact to see if there is any interest in exploring the pipe organ could include piano teachers, their adult students, church pianists, and those who play occasionally but might like to learn more about the organ. The instructors should be local. We certainly have a variety of pipe and electronic organs in Lexington area churches to choose from for teaching purposes.

We currently have five chapter members who have agreed to serve on the task force, but we need others to volunteer (or to be drafted by yours truly). If you would like to serve on this task force, please notify me by either phone or e-mail as is listed below. Of course, most anything we would plan is subject to change because of the pandemic. But we could at least see if it is feasible to look at doing this in the summer of 2023. Our initial meetings would be virtual by Zoom due to the pandemic.

I miss all of you during this time of keeping social distance. It is my hope that the virus situation will end soon, and we can all be together once again.

MEMBER NEWS



account:

Hello fellow Lexington AGO members. As many of you know, I recently retired from full time worship ministry after serving almost 17 years at Tates Creek Christian Church. I accepted a part time music position with First Christian Church, Sun City Center, Florida, that starts in mid-October.

I had planned a 4-5 week post-retirement trip and was able to complete 4 weeks of it before returning to Lexington. I signed all the papers to sell my Lexington home on my iPhone while sitting in my hotel room in Seattle! I came home to starting pitching "stuff" and packing. Besides on week 5, I would have been in New Orleans just in time to evacuate for Hurricane Ida!

In addition to enjoying many of the national parks, and returning to Seattle for a second visit, I enjoyed driving down the Oregon Coast, seeing Mt. St. Helen's, relaxing in Scottsdale for a few days and exploring Carlsbad Caverns. I drove just under 8,000 miles.



However, the best highlight took place in Salt Lake City on Temple Square. I have been there twice before to hear the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and organ recitals. But this time, I met their newest and youngest organist, Joseph Peeples. While chatting he asked if I wanted to do a crawl inside the 130 rank Schoenstein located in the 21,000 seat Conference Center. I was thrilled to do it. After climbing up to the back row level of the choir loft, we went to see the 6 (yes, 6!) blowers for the organ. They have to bring them up one at a time or they blow a circuit. Then we climbed up two full stories to get to the bottom level of the organ. We walked through the typically small door and when inside I squeezed(!) behind a support beam to get to the center of the organ. Right in from of me was a 32' Principal pipe. I felt so small. After we finished, he took my pic at the 5 manual console. The back was off as they had just upgraded the memory levels the previous week. I can't share the pic on Facebook as it is the property of the LDS Church, but they said I can share via text. Text me if you have my phone number. My secret: although I enjoyed it, I would have loved seeing inside the 206 rank Aeolian-Skinner in the Tabernacle. The organists secret there: they prefer the AS too. Haha.






