For historical purposes the large scaled diapason in the Skinner Great division was retained and the name changed to Steiner Phone after a member of the organ committee and former Minister of Music, Betsy D. Steiner. The name is a cliche' on an early organ stop, a Stinter Phone.

The Clarinet on the Positiv, the Bourdon on the Swell, and the Hohlflöte on the pedal are pipes that were secured from a 1925 E. M. Skinner and reconditioned for use in this new instrument.
